Some students showed improvement in language skills and a stronger desire to share Korean culture and education while broadening their perspectives. Gained a sense of pride and confidence from the experience of conversing with students from another country. Developed greater curiosity about Japanese cuisine through the food culture experience. Although students were able to meet via Zoom, coordinating a suitable time was challenging, as the partner school participated after regular classes while
	our students joined after club activities. Limited familiarity with Zoom also made smooth communication difficult. Nevertheless, students exchanged social media contacts and expressed their intention to continue building connections in the future.
Future Plans (*Follow-up Schedule, Additional Exchange Measures)	After the Zoom exchange, discussions with Mr. Yutaka Tanabe explored the possibility of arranging another session to strengthen student connections. However, due to scheduling constraints, this could not be realized. Instead, emphasis was placed on encouraging students to develop individual friendships.
